

4th Annual Asian Health Symposium: Best Clinical Practices in Medicine for the Asian American Patient

The national Asian population has grown rapidly in the last decade, presenting big challenges to healthcare providers in eliminating healthcare disparities. In light of the special needs of the Asian community, many of whom are immigrants, the Asian Health Institute, University of California, San Francisco, started the Asian Health Symposium series in 2012 to educate healthcare providers on the health and healthcare needs of Asians.

The 4th annual Asian Health Symposium will highlight five specific areas for this unique community, including cancer, cardiovascular, geriatrics, integrative medicine, and global health and infectious disease with special emphasis on the differences in Asian patients.

This symposium will help bridge the knowledge and practice gaps in treating the many diseases and health issues that have significant impacts on the Asian community including: common cancer conditions that affect Asians most, including cancer genetics and immunology; cardiovascular issues that are on the rise in Asians: hypertension, heart failures, atrial fibrillation, and diabetic cardiomyopathy, as well as anticoagulation issues. The course also features geriatric issues that include the continuum of care, polypharmacy, distinction between dementia and Alzheimer's disease, and Parkinsonism; integrative medicine that includes a general overview of the common healing approaches from Asia commonly adopted by the community: acupuncture, yoga and herbal medicines; as well as infectious diseases that include travel medicine, hepatitis B & C and the controversies around vaccination requirements.

TARGET AUDIENCE

Designed for family and primary care physicians, internists, and specialists, as well as nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurses, pharmacists, and other healthcare providers who face the unique health care needs and challenges of their Asian patients.

OBJECTIVES

After attending the two-day symposium, attendees will be able to:

Cancer

- Recognize the main types of cancers that afflict the Asian communities most, such as lung cancer;
- Develop a heightened awareness of cancers that have low screening rates in the Asian communities most:
- Understand the current roles of genetics and immunology in cancer prevention and treatment and implications in Asian patients.

Cardiovascular

- Discuss the state-of-the-art treatment in atrial fibrillation;
- Offer appropriate treatment to Asian patients in heart failure with preserved ejection fraction;
- Incorporate new hypertension guidelines in clinical practice as deemed appropriate;
- Increase the accuracy in the diagnosis of diabetic cardiomyopathy in Asian American patients;
- Discuss the clinical disparities in the use of anticoagulants in Asian Americans.

Geriatrics

- Offer appropriate transitional care for the entire healthcare spectrum to Asian patients;
- Beware of the all-too-common polypharmacy issues with the geriatric population;
- Offer differential treatments to Asian patients between dementia and Alzheimer's disease;
- Offer culturally appropriate treatments to Asian patients with Parkinson's disease.

Integrative Medicine

- Integrate the use of yoga in patients as a therapeutic treatment modality in chronic illnesses such as back pain, anxiety, depression, cardiovascular diseases, and cancer;
- Offer acupuncture as a culturally-appropriate treatment option to the Asian patients when indicated;
- Offer appropriate guidance to patients regarding use of herbal medicines.

Global Health and Infectious Diseases

- Offer guidance to patients in their vaccination needs during their trip preparation phase;
- Understand the controversies regarding compulsory vaccination of school children;
- Offer state-of-the-art treatment to patients with Hepatitis B and/or C.
